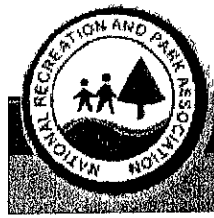

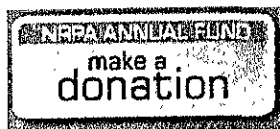

The Midwest Institute is nationally recognized for the quality of its sessions. Each session is reviewed and selected from the many proposals that were submitted. Attendees will gain in-depth knowledge from experts in the park and recreation profession.

GENERAL SESSION

What People in Charge Should Know about People Who Aren't

Bernie Hayen, Director of Finance, City of Manhattan, Kansas

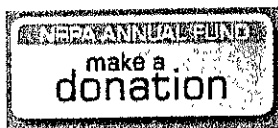

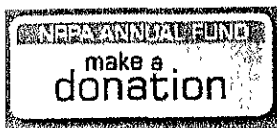
