Information on Income/Poverty Levels

I have attached to this memo what information that I have been able to gather pursuant to Alderman French's request for income and poverty level figures. In most cases the smallest unit I could find information for was Pennington County. The median income in Pennington County according to the US Census Bureau is \$37,728. The Census Bureau figures indicate that 12.5% or 11,332 Pennington County residents live in poverty. These are based on the 2002 numbers which were the most recent that I could obtain. I have attached the 2004 poverty thresholds used by the Census Bureau to give you some idea of what the numbers represent. I have also attached the Health and Human Services Federal Poverty Guidelines for you to review. These guidelines are the guidelines the State uses for its energy assistance program and for the Food Tax Refund Program. The State's energy assistance program provides aid to those at 160% of the poverty level and the food tax program provides aid to those at up to 150% of the poverty level.
