


Seminar Presenters



**George Washington,
aka Dean Malissa**

Dean Malissa has performed as General Washington at a wide variety of venues including at the White House, during the visit of President Nicolas Sarkozy of France, at Washington's Mount Vernon Estate & Gardens, the Smithsonian Institution, National Constitution Center, Chicago Historical Society and many other performances around the USA. Malissa is a life-long resident of Philadelphia, where he has been a performer since childhood. He happily and voluntarily left corporate America in 1999 and in "Act II" of his adult life pursued acting as a profession. He has performed and continues to be cast in film, TV, commercial, radio, stage and voiceover productions although his historical portrayal of George Washington represents 95% of his work today. His portrayal of Washington has proven to be one of the richest experiences in his life. It is often daunting, continually challenging, always interesting and humbling work. His film work as George Washington includes "Moments in Time – Valley Forge: The Crucible" (Discovery Channel), and a film for the National Flag Foundation.




**Thomas Jefferson,
aka Bill Barker**

Bill Barker is known as the quintessential Thomas Jefferson. His resemblance to Jefferson is uncanny and his knowledge of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution is second to none. Portraying Thomas Jefferson, Barker lectures sans script on any subject relating to the founding father. An historical scholar and professional actor, Barker not only embodies Jefferson, he becomes him. He has enjoyed portraying Thomas Jefferson in a variety of settings over the past twenty years. He was cast as Jefferson in the musical *1776*. Barker first came to Colonial Williamsburg in the spring of 1993 to perform as Jefferson in a film made to honor Ambassador and Mrs. Walter H. Annenberg. He has continued to appear as Jefferson in Colonial Williamsburg, and assists in the development of Jefferson programs for the Foundation. He appeared as Jefferson in programs aired on ABC, NBC, CBS, PBS, CNN, The History Channel, and C-SPAN.



**Abraham Lincoln,
aka Fritz Klein**

Richard F. (Fritz) Klein is considered one of the nation's foremost Lincoln actors, who makes Lincoln and his period of history come alive. Klein was born in 1948 and raised in Southern California. He graduated from Concordia College in Ft. Wayne, Indiana in 1970 and began acting as a hobby in 1975. The first time he was asked to portray Abraham Lincoln was in 1976 at a municipal celebration of the nation's bicentennial. He began acting full-time in 1980. Since then, the role has taken him to some 35 states for film and television, on stage, and as a motivational speaker. He now resides in Springfield, Illinois with his wife and family, where he performs for some of the city's 500,000 annual visitors.



**Theodore Roosevelt,
aka James Foote**

James Foote is oftentimes mistaken for the past president. With his encyclopedic knowledge and admiration of Roosevelt, Foote brings the former president to life with his words and manner. His first-person portrayals are riveting as he addresses topics ranging from conservation, leadership, citizenship, motivation, and ethics, subjects dear to Theodore Roosevelt himself. Foote has been recreating the persona of Theodore Roosevelt for fifteen years where he has traveled the country as Roosevelt, performing at events like the commissioning of the nuclear-powered aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt and appearing on national television. His interest in Theodore Roosevelt goes beyond his uncanny resemblance. The glasses, mustache and build kept drawing the question, "Did anyone ever tell you that you look just like Teddy Roosevelt?" Says Foote, "I began learning everything I could about the man." He now recites most of his speeches by heart and can deliver them in the distinctive, high-pitched voice for which the 26th president is known.

Kathleen Novak

Kathleen Novak serves as the Mayor of Northglenn, Colorado and is a Special Member of the Graduate Faculty for the Graduate School of Business Administration at the University of Colorado at Denver, and an affiliate faculty member at Regis University's School for Professional Studies. Mayor Novak is active in the National League of Cities, serving as 2008 First Vice President and on the NLC Leadership Training Council. Novak consults in the areas of process facilitation, leadership development, management training, team building, and retreat facilitation. She has worked as an international consultant, specializing in program development, curriculum development, and training. She recently contributed to *Working Together: A Guide for Elected and Appointed Officials*, published by the International City/County Management Association and the National League of Cities.



Dr. David Van Slyke

David Van Slyke is an Associate Professor of Public Administration in the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Syracuse University and a senior research associate in the Campbell Institute of Public Affairs. He is a public management specialist and teaches Public Organizations and Management and a Project Management course as well as a course on the Implementation of Social Policy at the Maxwell School. His research areas focus on public management topics including privatization and public-private partnerships, contracting and contract management, policy implementation, strategic management, and philanthropy. He has published on public management topics in journals such as the *Public Administration Review*, the *Journal of Public Administration Research and Theory*, *Administration and Society*, *Organization Science*, the *American Review of Public Administration*, *Public Performance and Management Review*, *Environment and Planning C: Government and Policy*, *Local Government Studies*, and the *International Journal of Public Administration*. Van Slyke is the recipient of the 2002 Best Article Award and the 1999 Best Conference Paper Award from the Academy of Management's Public-Nonprofit Division for a co-authored article that appeared in *Organization Science*.



Malcom Chapman

Malcom "Chap" Chapman is president and chief training officer of the Chapman Group located in Rapid City, South Dakota. Chapman has been a member of the Rapid City Common Council since 2004 and was one of the founders of the Black Hills Society for Training and Development formed in 1999. He was a Captain in the United States Marine Corp and serves as a consultant with the Center for Naval Analysis, a Washington, DC naval think tank, on base closing issues as it relates to the community's youth. With a strong passion for education and training, Malcom is an energetic member of his local community where he is actively involved in several community youth programs and serves on a number of local community boards. Chapman is a respected motivational speaker at conventions and corporate meetings while his main enthusiasm is conducting leadership training programs across the United States.
