AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

PETROGLYPH SURVEY AND RECORDATION PROJECT FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

THIS IS AN AGREEMENT made on this _____ day of September 2008, between the City of Rapid City, 300 Sixth Street, Rapid City, South Dakota 57701, hereinafter referred to as OWNER, and Day Star Research, hereinafter referred to as CONSULTANT. This agreement will provide the community with the survey and recordation of a petroglyph site located in Rapid City, South Dakota.

OWNER and CONSULTANT in consideration of their mutual covenants herein agree in respect to the performance of professional consulting services by CONSULTANT and the payment for those services by OWNER as set forth below.

SECTION 1 - BASIC SERVICES OF CONSULTANT

1.1 General

CONSULTANT shall provide to OWNER professional consulting services in all phases of the Project to which this Agreement applies as hereinafter provided. These services will include serving as OWNER's professional consulting representative for the Project and furnishing professional survey and recordation services.

1.2 Scope of Work

The Basic Services Scope of Work is described in Exhibit A and shall include surveying and recording the petroglyph site and completing a test excavation for archaeological deposits.

SECTION 2 - ADDITIONAL SERVICES OF CONSULTANT

2.1 Services Requiring Authorization in Advance

If authorized in writing by OWNER, CONSULTANT shall furnish Additional Services of the types listed in paragraphs 2.1.1 through 2.1.3, inclusive. These services are not included as part of Basic Services except to the extent provided otherwise in Exhibit A; these will be paid for by OWNER as indicated in Section 5.

- 2.1.1 Services resulting from significant changes in the general scope, extent or character of the Project including, but not limited to, changes in size, complexity, or method of financing; and revising previously accepted studies, reports or design documents when such revisions are required by changes in laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders enacted subsequent to the preparation of such studies, reports or documents.
- 2.1.2 Preparing to serve or serving as consultant or witness for OWNER in any litigation, arbitration or other legal or administrative proceeding involving the Project (except for assistance in consultations which is included as part of Basic Services).

2.1.3 Additional services in connection with the Project, excluding services, which are to be furnished by OWNER in accordance with Section 3, and services not otherwise provided for in this Agreement.

SECTION 3 - OWNER'S RESPONSIBILITIES

OWNER shall do the following in a timely manner so as not to delay the services of CONSULTANT:

- 3.1 Ms. Karen Bulman, Planner with the Rapid City Growth Management Department, shall act as OWNER's representative with respect to the services to be rendered under this Agreement. Ms. Bulman shall have complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, interpret and define OWNER's policies and decisions with respect to CONSULTANT's services for the Project. All work will be done in consultation with the South Dakota Historic Preservation Office.
- 3.2 Assist CONSULTANT by placing at CONSULTANT's disposal all available information pertinent to the Project.
- 3.3 Examine all studies, reports, sketches, drawings, proposals and other documents presented by CONSULTANT, obtain advice of an attorney, insurance counselor and other consultants as OWNER deems appropriate for such examination and render in writing decisions pertaining thereto within a reasonable time so as not to delay the services of CONSULTANT.
- 3.4 Give prompt written notice to CONSULTANT whenever OWNER observes or otherwise becomes aware of any development that affects the scope or timing of CONSULTANT's services.
- Furnish or direct CONSULTANT to provide negotiated Additional Services as stipulated in paragraph 2.1 of this Agreement or other services as required.

SECTION 4 - PERIOD OF SERVICE

4.1 The CONSULTANT'S period of service shall complete the scope of work stated in Exhibit A by March 30, 2009, provided a written "Notice to Proceed" is issued by September 16, 2008. The Petroglyph Survey and Recordation Project shall be submitted for review by February 27, 2009. The CONSULTANT'S services shall be provided in general accordance with the schedule as defined in EXHIBIT B.

SECTION 5 - PAYMENTS TO CONSULTANT

5.1 Methods of Payment for Services and Expenses of CONSULTANT

- 5.1.1 For Basic Services. OWNER shall pay CONSULTANT for Basic Services rendered under Section 1 (Scope of Work in Exhibit A) an amount not-to-exceed \$9,850.00.
 - 5.1.1.1 Fixed Fee. A fixed fee of \$ 9,850.00 shall be paid upon completion of the approved final report.

5.2 Times of Payments

5.2.1 CONSULTANT shall submit the final statement for Basic Services rendered.

5.3 Other Provisions Concerning Payments

- 5.3.1 In the event of termination by OWNER upon completion of any phase of Basic Services, progress payments due CONSULTANT for services rendered through such phase shall constitute total payment for such services. In the event of such termination by OWNER during any phase of the Basic Services, CONSULTANT also will be reimbursed for the charges of independent professional associates and consultants employed by CONSULTANT to render Basic Services incurred through such phase. In the event of any such termination, CONSULTANT will be paid for unpaid Reimbursable Expenses previously incurred.
- 5.3.2 The employees of CONSULTANT, professional associates and consultants, whose time is directly assignable to the program shall keep and sign a time record showing the element of the Project, date and hours worked, title of position and compensation rate.
- 5.3.3 Records. The CONSULTANT shall maintain an accurate cost keeping system as to all costs incurred for this Agreement and shall produce for examination books of accounts, bills, invoices and other vouchers or certified copies thereunder if originals be lost. CONSULTANT shall produce these records at such reasonable time and place as may be designated by the OWNER and shall permit extracts and copies thereof to be made during the contract period and for three years after the date of final payment to CONSULTANT.

CONSULTANT shall maintain time records and payroll records of the principal and all personnel for time spent performing work on the project described in this Agreement for a period of three years from the conclusion of the project.

Upon reasonable notice, the CONSULTANT will allow OWNER'S auditors to audit all records of the CONSULTANT related to this Agreement. These records shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. All records shall be kept for a period of three (3) years after final payment under Agreement is made and all other pending matters are closed.

- 5.3.4 Inspection of Work. OWNER auditors shall at reasonable times be accorded proper CONSULTANT facilities for review and inspection of the work in this Agreement. OWNER shall have access to CONSULTANT's premises and to all books, records, correspondence, instructions, receipts, vouchers and memoranda of every description pertaining to this Agreement.
- 5.3.5 Audits. The CONSULTANT shall, with reasonable notice, afford representatives of the OWNER reasonable facilities for examination and audits of the cost account records; shall make such returns and reports to a representative as he may require; shall produce and exhibit such books, accounts, documents and property as he may determine necessary to inspect and shall, in all things, aid him in the performance of his duties.
- 5.3.6 Payment shall be made subject to audit by duly authorized representatives of the OWNER.

5.4 Ownership of Data

Documents and all products of this Agreement are to be the property of the OWNER.

5.5 Publication and Release of Information

The CONSULTANT shall not copyright material developed under this Agreement without written authorization from the OWNER. The OWNER reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use, the work for government purposes.

5.6 Acquisition of Property or Equipment

The acquisition of property or equipment will be in accordance with 49 CFR 18.32.

5.7 Personnel Employment

The CONSULTANT warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONSULTANT, to solicit or secure this agreement, and that he has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONSULTANT, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts, or any other considerations, contingent upon or resulting from the award of making of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, the OWNER shall have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, or, in its discretion to deduct from the agreement price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fees, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or contingent fee.

5.8 Nondiscrimination/ADA

The CONSULTANT agrees to comply with the requirements of Title 49, CFR Part 21 and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The CONSULTANT agrees to submit upon request quarterly Title VI (Civil Rights) State of Contractor reports to the State. The CONSULTANT agrees to provide services in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

5.9 Claims

To the extent authorized by law, the CONSULTANT shall indemnify and hold harmless the OWNER, its employees and agents, against any and all claims, damages, liability and court awards including costs, expenses and attorney fees, to the extent such claims are caused by any negligent performance of professional services by the CONSULTANT, its employees, agents, subcontractors or assignees.

To the extent authorized by law, the OWNER shall indemnify and hold harmless the CONSULTANT, its employees and agents, against any and all claims, damages, liability and court awards including costs, expenses and attorney fees, to the extent such claims are caused by OWNER'S negligent acts in connection with the PROJECT and acts of its employees, agents, subcontractors or assignees.

It is further agreed that any and all employees of either party, while engaged in the performance of any work or services, shall not be considered employees of the other party, and that any and all claims that may or might arise under the Worker's Compensation Act of the State of South Dakota on behalf of said employees, while so engaged on any of the work

or services provided to be rendered herein, shall in no way be the obligation or responsibility of the other party.

5.10 Acceptance and Modification

This Agreement together with the Exhibits and schedules identified above constitute the entire agreement between OWNER and CONSULTANT and supersede all prior written or oral understandings. This Agreement and said Exhibits and schedules may only be amended, supplemented, modified or canceled after consultation with, and approval in writing by, the parties to this Agreement.

5.11 Termination or Abandonment

The CONSULTANT and the OWNER share the right to terminate this Agreement upon giving thirty (30) days written notice of such cancellation to the other party. If this Agreement is terminated under this paragraph, CONSULTANT shall deliver to OWNER all work product produced up to the time of termination. OWNER shall reimburse CONSULTANT for all work completed to the date of termination.

SECTION 6- GOVERNING LAW

This agreement and any dispute arising out of this agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of South Dakota.

6.1 Forum Selection

Any dispute arising out of this contract shall be litigated in the state court in South Dakota, which includes the City of Rapid City, currently, the Seventh Circuit Judicial Court for the State of South Dakota.

SECTION 7 - MERGER CLAUSE

This written agreement including Exhibit A - "Scope of Work – Petroglyph Survey and Recordation Project, Exhibit B - "Project Schedule," Exhibit C – "Manhour Estimate", and Exhibit D – "Proposal for Survey, Recording, Test Excavation, and NRHP Evaluation of Archaeological and Historic Sites in the Gap, Rapid City, South Dakota," and "Request for Proposals for the Petroglyph Survey and Recordation Project" constitutes the entire agreement of the parties. No other promises or consideration are a part of this agreement.

SECTION 8 - CERTIFICATION REGARDING DEBARMENT, SUSPENSION, INELIGIBILITY AND VOLUNTARY EXCLUSION

CONSULTANT certifies, by signing this agreement, that neither it nor its Principals is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any Federal department or agency.

Scope of Work:

Part A: Survey and record the petroglyph site to include rock art, historic inscriptions, and historic billboards painted on the sandstone cliffs in the area. Documentation will include a survey report that follows the stipulations set out in the "Guidelines for Cultural Resource Surveys and Survey Reports". The CONSULTANT will confer with the staff of the State Historic Preservation Office concerning research and specific instructions prior to beginning the project. The final report submitted to the Growth Management Office will include two survey reports per the guidelines and an additional survey report in a copy ready format. Included in the reports will be a determination of eligibility for the National Register.

Part B: CONSULTANT will provide a test excavation on the creek terrace to determine whether intact archaeological deposits exist.

All work will be done in consultation with the South Dakota Historic Preservation Office.

Summary

The proposed project is designed to record and evaluate for historic significance archaeological sites on city property on Cowboy Hill, forming the south side of the water gap through which Rapid Creek flows. This project area lies within the city limits of Rapid City and is commonly referred to as the "Gap." Archaeological sites in this area will be recorded and evaluated for their historic significance in regard to the National Register of Historic Places. The primary focus will be on recording the rock art (petroglyphs), historic inscriptions, and historic billboards painted on the sandstone cliffs in this area.

Introduction

A variety of archaeological and historic features of potential significance have been observed on the top and slopes of Cowboy Hill on the south side of the Gap. Although a prehistoric quartzite quarry was reported for the top of Cowboy Hill, the location of this site (39PN1) has not been clearly established. Quartzite quarries are scattered throughout the Hogback formation; thus, it is possible that one exists within the proposed project area. Many panels of rock art have been observed on the cliffs along the top and sides of the hill. Most of these take the form of abraded grooves; however, at least one panel of Pecked Realistic style and one incised panel are present, as well. In addition, several historic inscriptions at the east end of the cliffs appear to be from Rapid City's early days. Higher on the cliffs are the remnants of several painted "billboards" from the early days of the city.

Although this area was the scene of great destruction during the 1972 Rapid City flood, a preliminary examination of the creek terraces suggests the presence of undisturbed terrace deposits immediately below the cliffs. Given the proximity to Rapid Creek, shelter, tool stone, and other resources, it is likely that buried archaeological deposits exist at the eastern end of the hill where the cliffs meet the higher stream terrace.

In addition to providing important information on the history of human use of the Black Hills region, better records of the archaeological and historic sites in the Gap will allow for improved site preservation efforts. NRHP status provides extra protection for sites that are in public ownership or that may come into public ownership at a later time. Most importantly, it informs state preservation officials and city managers of the locations of historically significant sites, so that they can better plan for their continued preservation.

Work Plan

The proposed project entails recording the known sites and historic features and examining the project area for additional sites, including the elusive prehistoric quartzite quarry ("Option A"). In addition, if the City and South Dakota Historic Preservation Office concur, a small test excavation will be done on the creek terrace at the east end of the cliffs to determine whether intact archaeological deposits exist there ("Option B"). This will allow project personnel to establish more accurate site boundaries and will provide information important for preservation planning.

All work will be done in consultation with the South Dakota Historic Preservation Office.

Sites will be recorded in the following manner. First, a State of South Dakota archaeological site form will be completed for each site discovered. This records such information as the environmental setting, location, ownership, and description of rock art, artifacts, or other cultural material present at the site. Next, color slides and black-and-white photographs will be taken using a 35-mm film camera, and digital images will be made using a medium-resolution 35-mm digital camera. The faded "billboards" will be recorded with digital infrared imaging, in hopes of discerning their original appearance. Finally, all field activities and basic site information will be recorded in the form of field notes.

The proposed test excavation will involve one unit measuring 1 x 1 meter. This will be dug using standard archaeological methods, including screening all sediments, acquiring sediment samples for later analysis, documenting all sediment changes and cultural features. Any artifacts encountered will be collected and processed for permanent curation at the South Dakota Archaeological Research Center in Rapid City. Photographic negatives, digital files, and field forms and notes will also be placed there for curation.

Volunteers will be recruited from the South Dakota Archaeological Society to help with the project. By prior arrangement, the South Dakota Archaeological Research Center will loan all necessary equipment for the excavation portion of the project (Option B).

Deliverable Products

All information thus collected will be compiled into a project report, including a determination of eligibility for the National Register for the petroglyph and historic inscriptions site, under Option A, and an evaluation of the archaeological potential of the adjacent stream terrace, under Option B. This report, as well as photographic negatives, copies of digital image files, and site forms, will be submitted to the City of Rapid City, the South Dakota State Historic Preservation Office, and the South Dakota Archaeological Research Center.
