This eclectic two-story side gabled house combines elements of the Stick, Colonial Revival, and Craftsman styles. Each level is clad with a different material; clapboards on the first floor, plain shingles on the second story, and stucco with horizontal and vertical bands in each upper gable. It has a porch covering the facade with paired Tuscan columns and a random rubble wall. There is a large gabled wall dormer covered with shingles and stucco; it has triangular knee braces and small brackets. The east wall has a shed roof oriel, double hung windows, and the same wall materials as the facade. A two-story enclosed porch was added to the rear in 1917.

The republicans, he said, had chosen white, the emblem of purity. The democrats, as usual, had picked yellow. You know, he remarked, what it denotes.

The prohibitionists had picked blue, a chunk of heaven's canopy, denoting the embracing of the whole world under their banner eventually.

The socialists' color is red, the red flag being an emblem of the party, it was stated.

Another authority, however, informed the news gatherer that the last named party was the only one that had made a choice, the colors being assigned to the other different parties.
