

School Money.

Superintendent Scriber has just made out his April apportionment of school, money. There was \$1,531.85 to be divided among the nine townships and Rapid City in proportion to the number of children of school age. This amounts to a fraction over \$2.90 per capita, and gives the following amounts to the various townships:

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Mr. Wood made the argument against the protest, claiming that the board had no authority to consider the matter, but must simply add up the tally sheets and declare the result and issue the certificates. Each council is judge of the election of its own members, and the only thing for Mr. McCarthy to do is to make his contest before the new board. He brought out some interesting incidents about the charter and the bistory of elections. He was the attorney for the town when it was made a city and given this chapter. whole matter of form of election was left to him. The charter provides that:

There shall be elected in said city by the qualified voters thereof, a mayor, a clerk, an assessor, a treasurer, a police justice, and in each ward one alderman.

Mr. Wood decided this to mean that every voter in the city might vote for every alderman, and the first election was so held, one box and one set of judges and clerks being used. At a subsequent election under direction of the council four distinct ward polling places were used. The last election presented a still different one of the possible forms, with its four boxes at one place. However he thought the last election legal, since the charter is susceptible of that interpretation.

On motion of Mr. Mohr, seconded by Mr. Davis, the council then proceeded to foot up the poll-books and declared the result of the election.

—In the contest for the Dendwood shooting club's gold badge Lige Butter-field has been victorious, having won it in three successive matches.
